


<b>Examples</b>	
<b>Ability</b>	I can't work hard as she does.
<b>Advice</b>	We should meet more often.
<b>Duty</b>	Students must do their homework.
<b>Permission</b>	You can have a day off if you tired.
<b>Possibility</b>	We could go out for dinner tonight.
<b>Prohibition</b>	You mustn't cheat in the exam.
<b>Request</b>	Would you mind if I sat here ?

Modal verbs and their function	
Ability	Can, Could
Advice	Should, Ought to
Duty	Must
Permission	Can, Could, May
Possibility	May, Might, Can, Could
Prohibition	Can't, Mustn't, May not
Request	May, Will, Would

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Reviewer comments:

Audio: To talk about ability, we use “can/could”. “Should / Ought to” will be in advice. When we mention something covering a sense of duty, we use “must”. “Can/Could/May” will be used in permission. To talk about possibility, “May/might/can/could” are very popular, and vice versa, prohibition will be identified by “can’t/mustn’t/may not”. The last one, to request, it is recommended that “may/will/would” should be suitable.




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
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

Audio: The structure of passive will be as follows: O of active voice will be the S of passive voice, we keep the modal verb but bear in mind that, after “modal V”, we need “be + past participle” – a signature of Passive voice, the last part of this sentence could be optional (by + O)

<p>Audio: The example here helps you understand more. In Active voice, it is “They may design a new project”. “A new project will be the subject of Passive voice, we keep “may” – modal verb in this sentence but make sure that after “may”, we need “be + past participle”, It means “be designed”. So we have “ A new project may be designed”.</p>

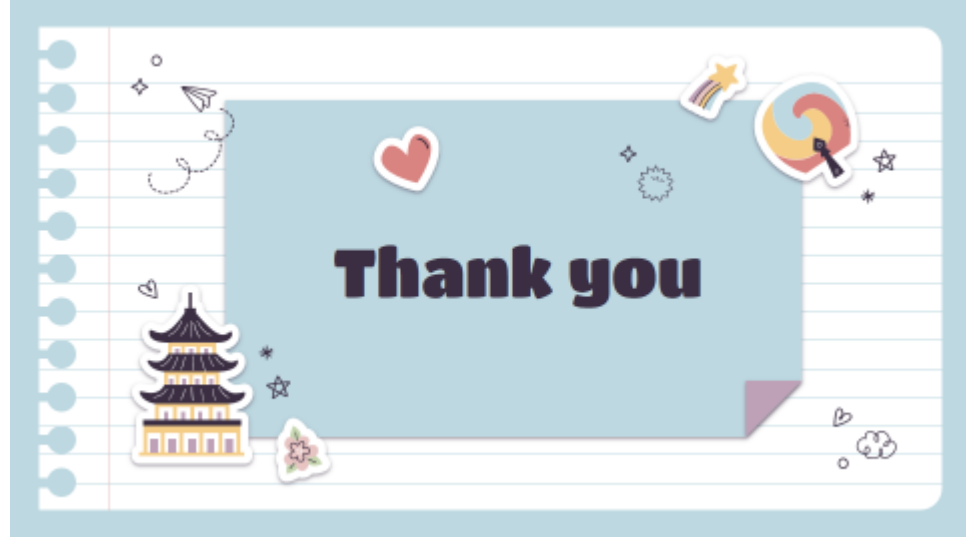
