STRESS IN WORDS WITH MORE THAN 3 SYLLABLES

I. Secondary stress

- Some long words have a secondary stress which is much weaker than the primary stress.
- Primary stress is marked with a raised vertical line and and secondary stress with the lowered vertical line at the beginning of the syllable.

E.g. Economic \rightarrow / ekə'nomik/

II. Prefix and Suffix

STRUCTURE: [a prefix] + a base word + [a suffix]

• A prefix or a suffix can modify the meaning of the word and even <u>change the stress position</u>.

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E.g. economy (n) + ic = economic (adj)
/ɪˈkɒnəmi/ /ˌekəˈnɒmɪk/
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1. Prefix:

'Dependent \rightarrow **In**'dependent

'Necessary → **Un**'necessary

'Logical → **II**'logical

'Regular → **Ir**'regular

Ad'vantage → **Dis**ad'vantage

1. Prefix:

• Prefixes are usually unstressed and they do not affect the stress position of base words.

1. Suffix:

Com'municate → Communi'cation

Ex'plain \rightarrow Expla'nation

E'conomy → Eco'nomic

III Note for you

Re'sponsible → Responsi'bility

• Suffixes [-tion, -ic, -ity] change the word stress on the syllabble right before them.
